CLEAN WATER STATE REVOLVING LOAN FUND PROGRAM CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION

TO: All Interested Citizens, Government Agencies and Public Groups

In accordance with the Nebraska Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) environmental review process, which is based on the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), an environmental review has been performed on the proposed agency action below:

This information reviews the environmental impact likely from a project. This project is planned to be federally funded wholly or in part through your tax dollars; therefore, you are entitled to take part in its review. The City of Ralston, Nebraska is planning to improve and rehabilitate its wastewater collection system. The Burlington Street project involves the Burlington Street extension, including the North and South Alignment Interceptor Sewer Rehabilitation. This portion primarily involves rehabilitating 12-inch sewer main. The Oak Park project includes approximately 1,135 linear feet of 8-inch sewer rehabilitation in addition to complete replacement of approximately 55 linear feet of 8-inch sanitary sewer.

The Engineer's total estimated cost for the proposed clean water project is \$9,726,000. The project was listed on the Project Planning List in the State Fiscal Year 2025 Intended Use Plan (IUP) and ranked at 72 priority points. Based on supporting documentation on file with the NDEE, this project was determined to be eligible for a 30-year loan with an annual interest rate of 0.7 percent and an annual administrative fee of 0.7 percent. The City is not eligible for CWSRF loan forgiveness, per criteria listed in the IUP.

Sewer use fees would be pledged to repay the CWSRF loan. For a typical residential connection, the current monthly sewer rate is \$10.64 per month, with an added charge of \$5.59 per centum cubic foot. This results in an average monthly sewer bill of \$48.01 for a typical 5,000-gallon monthly household sewer use when averaged over a year. The long-term average CWSRF Debt Service (including 10% coverage, and interest plus administrative payments) would be \$470,324 per year. Based on 2,311 active service connections, sewer rates may need to be raised by an additional \$16.96 to address the new debt service.

Categorical Exclusion Justification for Clean Water Projects

The proposed project was reviewed for eligibility for a categorical exclusion from National Environmental Policy Act review specified in 40 CFR (Code of Federal Regulations) Part 6.204. The project meets all criteria described in the above reference and the Department has determined that this project is eligible for a categorical exclusion. Consequently, a preliminary decision has been made that a Finding of No Significant Impact will not be prepared. Justification for categorical exclusion includes:

• The proposed action is not known or expected to have potentially significant environmental impacts on the quality of the human environment either individually or cumulatively over time;

- The proposed action is not known or expected to significantly affect federally or state listed threatened or endangered species or their critical habitat;
- The proposed action is not known or expected to significantly affect national natural landmarks or any property with nationally significant historic, architectural, prehistoric archeological or cultural value, including but not limited to, properties listed on or eligible for the National Register of Historic Places;
- The proposed action is not known or expected to significantly affect environmentally important natural resource areas as wetlands, prime farmland, wild and scenic rivers, and significant fish or wildlife habitat;
- The proposed action is not known or expected to have a significant effect on the pattern and type of land use (industrial, commercial, agricultural, recreational, residential) or growth and distribution of population including altering the character of existing residential areas, or may not be consistent with state or local government, or federally-recognized Indian tribe approved land use plans or federal land management plans;
- Based on review there are no new/relocated surface or groundwater discharges; the project is not being developed to
 provide capacity to service a population greater than 30% of that existing for the community; and it is supported by a
 State growth strategy. In addition, there will not be a substantial increase in volume/loading of pollutants to receiving
 streams; and
- Based on a review of the available mapping, a portion of the project is located within a 100-year flood plain. The local floodplain administrator will be contacted and may require a permit issuance for the project, and all floodplain elements of the Department's Title 123 regulations will be complied with; and
- The proposed action is not known or expected to cause significant public controversy.

The Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy shall revoke the categorical exclusion and shall require a full environmental review if, subsequent to the granting of exclusion, the state determines that the proposed project no longer meets the requirements for a categorical exclusion due to changes in the proposed project; or new evidence reveals that serious local or environmental issues exist; or federal, state, local or tribal laws are being violated.

This action is taken on the basis of careful review of the application and other supporting data, which are on file in the office of the NDEE. These are available for public review upon request. 


Figure 2: Oak Park Sewer Repair Map
